REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2010

The directors present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2010. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 and comply with current statutory requirements, the memorandum and articles of association and the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' (SORP 2005). The reference and administrative information pages form part of this report.

CONSTITUTION AND WORKING NAMES

The Peak District and South Yorkshire Branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England is an autonomous branch of the national charity with which it shares common aims. It is also a Company Limited by Guarantee not having share capital, and governed in accordance with its Memorandum of Association dated 2003. The area in which it operates is coterminous with the boundaries of Sheffield city, Rotherham, Barnsley and Doncaster Metropolitan Boroughs, the Peak District National Park, High Peak Borough and the parishes of Barlow, Holmesfield, Dronfield, Eckington, Unstone and Killamarsh in the North East Derbyshire District.

The charity runs the national park society, Friends of the Peak District. Its work in the wider Peak District is performed under this working name, while the name CPRE South Yorkshire is used for its work in that county.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The directors (trustees) who are known as the Executive Committee are appointed by the members of the charity and serve until the next Annual General Meeting at which all may seek re-election unless they have served for five consecutive years. New directors are recruited after open advertisement and selected to ensure that the Executive Committee has a range of skills and knowledge relevant to the charity's aims and objectives. A trustee induction process ensures new directors are quickly able to contribute to governance.

The Executive Committee meets six times a year and reviews its performance annually. Management is delegated to a paid Chief Executive who is responsible for implementation of the agreed strategic and annual plans.

OBJECTS AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objects are to promote and encourage, for the benefit of the public, the improvement and protection of the countryside within its boundaries and its towns and villages and the better development of the rural environment.

Its annual work is directed towards the achievement of objectives in four areas of activity viz:

- **Protecting the countryside** from whatever threatens it.
- **Enhancing the countryside** to make it more beautiful, more prosperous and more sustainable.
- **Engaging communities** to encourage people to value, use and care for the countryside. This means helping people to enjoy it and empowering communities to have a say in its future.
- **Maintaining an effective organisation** to enable the Peak District and South Yorkshire Branch of the CPRE to achieve its vision.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers or duties.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

- With financial support from the Brelms trust, we formalised the planning help we have previously provided on an ad hoc basis. We publicised a telephone 'planning helpline' and held a successful training course on the planning system for volunteers, parish councillors and others.
- Our Peak Power micro hydro project continued, with the launch of the study which showed that there were 150 potential sites for small scale hydro power generation and included in-depth case studies of 10 sites. Thanks to funding from Open Gate Trust, we were able to follow this with work to instigate and encourage a Micro Hydro Users group. Open Gate funding also enabled us to run three further community hydro workshops and three meetings of the newly formed Peak Hydro Forum.

- We launched new websites for both Friends of the Peak District and CPRE South Yorkshire. We also launched regular e-newsletters for both Friends of the Peak District and CPRE South Yorkshire.
- In 2010 we made some progress in resolving CPRE membership issues. The decision made at the AGM ensures people are now able to join Friends of the Peak District, CPRE South Yorkshire or CPRE Peak District and South Yorkshire. However we have found that the changes are difficult to communicate to our existing members and more work is needed.
- During the year, we contacted existing members to ask them to increase their membership contributions to the new rate of £27. Most members have done this, but some will need reminding in 2011. We also launched a Silver Peakland Guardian scheme and have been contacting existing members who donate more than £100 a year to upgrade their membership.
- Volunteer job descriptions were updated and new volunteers recruited. The feedback received from volunteers in response to a questionnaire circulated in December was very positive.
- Our Peak Power micro hydro project continued, with the launch of the study which showed that there were 150 potential sites for small scale hydro power generation and included in-depth case studies of 10 sites. Thanks to funding from Open Gate Trust, we were able to follow this with work to instigate and encourage a Micro Hydro Users group. Open Gate funding also enabled us to run three further community hydro workshops and three meetings of the newly formed Peak Hydro Forum.
- We have challenged the Peak District National Park Authority (PDNPA) hard over the soundness of their proposed new policies on renewable energy and climate change but our effect can't be judged until 2011/2012 when the new policies will be debated at the Examination in Public and later adopted.
- We have focused on reducing traffic impacts and more sustainable transport policies. Progress on reducing the impact of transport and associated infrastructure remains frustratingly small, exacerbated by lack of determination by both Derbyshire County Council and the PDNPA. We continue to keep pressure up, especially for lower carbon networks, via the review of Local Transport Plans and direct advocacy with key officers and councillors.
- Our new Take Back the Tracks campaign (against unsustainable and illegal off-roading) has exceeded expectations – we have catalysed the emergence of joint community campaigning groups and this has helped persuade DCC and the PDNPA to take more effective action, including proposing closures of the worst affected routes.
- The Backdale legal case concerning quarrying at Longstone Edge was finally resolved. The courts upheld the original inquiry victory; the site and land is now for sale and future minerals extraction looks unlikely – the end of a seven year campaign! Moves towards a third party buyout are currently on hold. Glebe Mines announced their closure which also heralds the end of open cast mining of fluorspar in the Peak.
- We pressed for the undergrounding of utilities and asked all the relevant utility companies to engage with the Ofgem scheme. In no small part due to our pressure, Central Electric (YEDL) finally stepped up to the plate! We also aimed for five completed schemes and came close with four: Hope, Sheldon, Rowland and Wardlow, quadrupling (in one year) that previously achieved (in five years!).
- We hosted the National Park Societies Conference at Buxton in September. It was attended by all the national park societies in England and Wales as well as national organisations. It was a valuable opportunity to learn from the experience of others and to share our local and national knowledge.
- We tried to prevent inappropriate major development and influence emerging plans and policies. We commented on all major developments but failed to prevent the Inland Port (Rossington, Doncaster) from being permitted. We had effective outcomes (positive influence) in many of the cases we commented on although the number of low carbon development proposals remains worryingly low. We commented on all new local planning policies proposed and continued to augment regional and national CPRE advocacy. Questionnaire research also showed our planning advice service to be highly valued by users.

- We have pressed that Doncaster Council to review their green belt policy. Council officers continue to refuse to accept the merits of our proposals to extend the Green Belt but we have increased key political and community support for our campaign and are now placed to lobby more effectively for a change of heart in 2011.
- We continue to highlight, through our media work, how poor the countryside protection offered to eastern Doncaster is. Unfortunately, although our press profile is high, commonly we are fighting a losing war against inappropriate developments.
- There was only one significant mineral planning case – the approval of further quarrying at Nearcliffe on the Don Gorge (Doncaster) in the face of our objection.
- We have achieved our aim of building relationships with the South Yorkshire countryside rangers, and of working more in South Yorkshire. We worked on 5 sites in South Yorkshire. We arranged two at Haythornthwaite Wood, one of which was cancelled because of snow. We had several new recruits, and averaged 10.6 volunteers at each activity. Our conservation volunteers were featured in a video by Voluntary Action Sheffield to promote volunteering and in their subsequent publicity.
- We have produced improved and specific communications for South Yorkshire, including the new Backyard newsletter.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

The branch's net outgoing resources for the year before movements on investments are £168,610 (2009: £237,683). Legacies received during the year amounted to £26,234 (2009:£11,368). Realised and unrealised gains on investments amounted to £27,711 (2009: gain £64,766), after taking this into account net outgoing resources for the year are £140,899 (2009: £172,917).

REVIEW OF FUNDRAISING ACTIVITIES

Fundraising was badly affected by the recession during 2010. We continued to develop new fundraising initiatives. We held the first 'Love the Peak week' in October, with members and supporters organising a range of community fundraising activities and increased the membership of our Peak Pound Partnership scheme for local tourism businesses. We developed a strategy for fundraising in South Yorkshire, drawing on our experiences in the Peak District.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The charity's funds have been invested in a balanced portfolio of shares and government stocks. The directors are advised by investment management consultants whose brief is to obtain the best financial return consistent with commercial prudence whilst working within agreed ethical guidelines, taking a moderate degree of risk and aiming to yield a balanced return from both income and capital growth.

REVIEW OF INVESTMENT PERFORMANCE

During the year £173,671 has been drawn down from the investments, and an additional £8,602 has been reinvested.

RESERVES POLICY

The trustees agreed that the equivalent of a year's expenditure should be kept in reserve to ensure that the charity could continue to work through any period of unforeseen difficulty. This is in addition to the value of the property it occupies. The trustees assess the reserves policy on an annual basis.

RISK MANAGEMENT POLICY

The Trustees have undertaken a risk management exercise in which the chief risks identified by the charity have been identified and action taken to address them. The two greatest risks are considered to be the following:

1. Failure to generate necessary income from the new fundraising activity undertaken. To minimise this risk a Finance and Fundraising subcommittee has been established to monitor results, and a fundraising strategy is in place and is reviewed regularly by the Trustees. A professional fundraiser has been employed and is responsible for monitoring and reporting on fundraising activities and for ensuring that the targets set are realistic.
2. Poor performance by investments resulting from a down turn in stock market performance and an unprofitable mix of shares and cash. To minimise the risk the charity will continue to use the services of a professional investment manager and to follow their expert advice. In addition the investment policy will be reviewed regularly and the investment manager informed as early as possible of the likely annual requirements for cash so that they can plan accordingly. The possible impact of market fluctuations will be a consideration in the long range financial projections.

SMALL COMPANY PROVISIONS

The report of the directors has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions for small companies under Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

INDEPENDENT EXAMINERS REPORT TO THE MEMBERS

I report on the accounts of the Peak District and south Yorkshire Branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England for the year ended 31 December 2010 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and related notes.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF DIRECTORS AND EXAMINER

The charity's trustees (who are also directors of the company for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 31 DECEMBER 2010

1. PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention as modified by the inclusion of certain fixed assets at valuation and investments at market value and in accordance with applicable accounting standards, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) and the Companies Act 2006. In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice on Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005).

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognised when received.

Legacies are recognised in the period in which the company is entitled to receipt and the amount can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Investment and grant income

Investment and grant income is accounted for in the period in which the company is entitled to receipt.

Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any VAT which cannot be recovered.

Certain expenditure is directly attributable to specific activities and has been included in those cost categories. Certain other costs, which are attributable to more than one activity, are apportioned across cost categories on the basis of an estimate of the proportion of time spent by staff on those activities:

- Costs of generating funds are those costs incurred in attracting voluntary income.
- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with countryside protection and enhancement, community engagement and organisational development and include both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost based on time spent.

Pension costs

The company contributes to a defined contribution scheme for certain staff and to personal pension schemes for other staff.

The costs of providing pensions are charged to the profit and loss account as incurred.

1. PRINCIPAL ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets, other than properties, are included at original cost less accumulated depreciation. Freehold land and buildings are stated at open market value and are revalued at intervals of not more than five years.

Depreciation is not provided on the freehold property as it is the company's policy to maintain the property in good repair. Consequently, the directors consider the life of the property to be so long that there is no significant annual depreciation. In accordance with FRS 15 and FRS 11, the directors have performed an impairment review, and it is their opinion that the carrying value of the freehold property is not higher than the recoverable amount. Other tangible fixed assets are depreciated on the straight line basis over their estimated useful lives as follows:-

Computer equipment	25%
General equipment	15%
Motor vehicles	20%

Fixed asset investments

Investments are included at closing mid-market value at the balance sheet date. Any gain or loss on revaluation is taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

Fund accounting

Funds held by the company are:-

Unrestricted funds - these funds are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the directors.

Designated funds - these funds are unrestricted funds which have been set aside at the discretion of the directors, for particular purposes.

Restricted funds - these funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the company. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when the funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Funds received specially for expenditure on fixed assets that are fully spent in the year and where the assets are used by the charity for core activities, are treated as unrestricted funds.
